Use the primary sources below to explore the meaning of lines in Romeo and Juliet.

Act 2, Scene 2, lines 1-30

- A. Read Friar Laurence's speech at the beginning of Act 2, Scene 2, in *Romeo and Juliet*. Explore the meaning of the lines. Consider what he says about medicine and poison.
- B. Peruse Gerard's Herbal and look through the table of contents. Record one interesting detail.
- C. Find the entry for "Sleepy Nightshade" (Lib. 2, p. 340-1). How does Gerard's description of this plant compare or contrast to the Friar's description of plants?
- D. Anything else about this primary source that is relevant to the play as a whole?

- G. What disease will medlars treat? What other names are associated with medlars in this book?
